8 Indian beaches are now Blue Flag certified by an international jury comprising representatives from UNWTO, UN Environment Programme, International Union for Conservation of Nature, and Foundation of Environment Education. This coveted eco-label has been awarded to eight beaches, including Ghoghla (Diu), Kasarkod and Padubidri (Karnataka), Kappad (Kerala), Rushikonda (AP), Golden (Odisha), Radhanagar (Andaman & Nicobar Islands) and Shivrajpur (Gujarat). The certification is given to the beaches that meet the stringent environmental protection, educational, and other sustainable benchmarks set by the FEE.

Internationally, India has now extended air travel bubbles to include 18 nations with the recent addition of Bangladesh and Ukraine. Talks are going on for including even more nations.

In a happy development, the number of cases reported in India has seen a marked decrease since mid-September. The country has reported an inspiring 89.2% recovery rate and things are starting to look steadily positive.
